Anna K. Morita, Psy.D.
Consortium Training Director
Primary Site Training Director



In 2004, Anna Morita completed a two-year postdoctoral fellowship in Neuropsychology at the Kaiser Foundation Rehabilitation Center. Her fellowship experience at Kaiser informed her goals to change and expand the Neuropsychology training program to what it is today. In 2007, Dr. Morita became the site Training Director and permanently changed the curriculum to a two-year postdoctoral residency to meet Houston Guidelines. In 2012, she developed the advanced practicum training program at KFRC in order to offer graduate students training opportunities in neurorehabilitation; and to offer postdoctoral residents the added experience of supervising students. In 2017, Dr. Morita successfully secured a second postdoctoral fellowship position which offered residents an added opportunity to work in Vacaville's Sports Concussion Clinic while also participating in outreach programming to local high schools. A second fellowship position also warranted development of the Northern California Neuropsychology Training Consortium of which Dr. Morita became the Consortium Training Director.

The Neuropsychology Consortium now offers at least three, full-time, two-year Neuropsychology postdoctoral fellowships that prepare fellows for board certification. Trainees now have a breadth of neuropsychological training opportunities that include working with inpatients and outpatients in clinics and the regional rehabilitation center. We are hopeful that the program will continue to expand and prepare fellows for a career in Neuropsychology within the Kaiser Healthcare System.

As the primary supervisor for the postdoctoral residents and advanced practicum students, Dr. Morita views her role as being one that fosters individual growth and reflective practice. She expects trainees to identify areas of interest within Neuropsychology in order to direct learning but also to develop a professional identity.

Dr. Morita's professional interests include adolescent care, stroke, and traumatic brain injury.

Richard L. Delmonico is the Director of Neuropsychology at the Kaiser Foundation Rehabilitation Center, Regional Lead for Neuropsychology Services for Kaiser Permanente Northern California, a member of the Kaiser NCAL Sports Concussion Work Group, and a Co-Founder of the Youth Sports Concussion Program at Kaiser Permanente Trauma Center, Vacaville. Dr. Delmonico is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Schurig Center for Brain Injury Recovery and the Board of Directors of the San Francisco Neurological Society. He was previously a member of the Board of Directors of the Brain Injury Association of California, and past president of the Northern California Neuropsychology Forum. Dr. Delmonico was an Associate Clinical Professor in the Department of Physical and Rehabilitation Medicine at the University of California, Davis School of Medicine (1999-2016) and an Adjunct Clinical Professor in the Clinical Psychology Training Program at Alliant University, San Francisco. Dr. Delmonico has been working in rehabilitation and neuropsychology over the past 30 years. His research, publications and professional presentations have focused on behavioral, sexuality, neuropsychological, emotional, substance abuse, and service utilization issues in persons with traumatic brain injury, stroke, and dementia. He has trained and supervised psychology externs, interns and Postdoctoral Residents for over 25 years and finds teaching professionally exciting.

Dr. Delmonico's professional interests include mild and severe traumatic brain injury.

Chuck Filanosky joined the staff at Kaiser Permanente in 2016 and is a full-time neuropsychologist at the Vacaville Medical Center where he divides his time between the Napa

Solano Youth Sports Concussion Clinic and the outpatient neuropsychological assessment service. Prior to this, he was on staff at the San Francisco VA Medical Center where he was involved in a variety of roles including training psychology practicum students, pre-doctoral interns, postdoctoral residents and medical residents in primary care and psychiatry. He was also an Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at UCSF.

Dr. Filanosky completed his Ph.D. at the Pacific Graduate School of Psychology in 2005 and his post-doctoral residency in neuropsychology and rehabilitation psychology at the Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York. He additionally holds a master's degree in education from Boston University. He has been active in professional advocacy and is a past president of the San Francisco Psychological Association and the Northern California Neuropsychology Forum. He is board certified in rehabilitation psychology.

Working with trainees has been one of the most satisfying aspects of Dr. Filanosky's career. His approach is a mentorship model, with training adapted to the professional developmental level of the trainee and informed by their ultimate interests and goals.

Professional interests include traumatic brain injury, post-traumatic stress disorder, and forensic issues.
