Kimberly Lanni, PhD, ABPP-CN Training Director

Kimberly Lanni, PhD, ABPP-CN is a Board-Certified Neuropsychologist within the Department of Mental Health and Wellness in Roseville and has been employed with Kaiser Permanente since 2017.

Dr. Lanni came to Kaiser as an experienced Neuropsychologist having previously held positions in a variety of settings (e.g., Academic Medical Center; Private Hospital (Acute Neurorehabilitation); In-Home Post-Acute Neurorehabilitation; University, Adjunct Faculty; Private Practice).

Dr. Lanni earned her PhD in Clinical Psychology with an emphasis in Neuropsychology at Washington State University. She completed an APA-accredited internship in Clinical Psychology – Neuropsychology Track & completed a 2-year APA-accredited postdoctoral residency in Clinical Neuropsychology with subspecialties in Cognitive Rehabilitation and PTSD at the VA Northern CA Healthcare System, meeting the Houston Guidelines for training in Clinical Neuropsychology.

Throughout her training and early professional career, Dr. Lanni has had involvement in several research programs at Washington State University, the UC Davis M.I.N.D. Institute, and UC Davis Center for Neuroscience. Her work has culminated in a variety of publications in Peer-Reviewed Journals as well as numerous professional presentations on Parkinson's disease, Multiple Sclerosis, and Autism Spectrum Disorders at international and national conferences, and she has served as an ad hoc reviewer for research in her specialty.

Dr. Lanni is invested in bringing the scientist-practitioner model to life in her clinical work with patients with a range of neurobehavioral and psychiatric conditions. In her role as Training Director and as a Supervisor, she shares her love of clinical neuropsychology and the importance of continuously integrating scientific work into clinical practice.

Dawn Levine, PhD is a clinical neuropsychologist within the Department of Sports Medicine at Kaiser Permanente located in the Golden 1 Sports Center.

Dr. Levine completed her bachelor's degree at UCLA and went on to complete her PhD in Clinical Psychology at Washington State University. She Completed her APA-accredited internship at the Long Beach VA in Clinical Psychology with an emphasis in Neuropsychology.

She returned to UCLA Semel/NPI for her postdoctoral residency where she was co-chief postdoctoral resident her second year. She came to Kaiser Permanente and helped to start both the outpatient neuropsychological program as well as the postdoctoral resident program.

Dr. Levine served as training director for some of those years and is proud of the several former postdoctoral residents that have been hired by Kaiser Permanente as well as in the surrounding area. While Dr. Levine worked as a traditional neuropsychologist for several years, she found her passion in sports concussion work.

She has served as a backup neuropsychologist for the then Oakland Raiders and more recently as the consulting neuropsychologist for the AHL Stockton Heat. She is also currently the regional lead neuropsychologist for Kaiser Permanente Northern CA Sports Concussion group.

She believes in the scientist-practitioner model and enjoys sharing her knowledge and love of clinical/sports neuropsychology in the form of supervision and didactic presentations.



May Jung Kim, PhD Primary Supervisor

May Jung Kim, PhD is a clinical neuropsychologist within the Department of Mental Health and Wellness at Kaiser Permanente in Roseville. Dr. Kim completed her bachelor's degree at the University of California, Berkeley. Her interests in faith, spirituality, and psychology, lead her to Fuller Theological Seminary, an APA accredited program, where she obtained her PhD in Clinical Psychology and master's degree in Christian Leadership.

During her doctorate program, she was exposed to the study of brain-behavior relationship, and from there on, her career in neuropsychology started. She completed her APA-accredited internship in Clinical Psychology – at VA Battle Creek Medical Center in Michigan, with an emphasis in neuropsychology.

Her two-year postdoctoral residency in Neuropsychology was completed at Kaiser Permanente Center for Neuropsychological Services in North Valley. Kaiser Permanente continues to be her professional home, initially working at Kaiser South Sacramento, and eventually returning to her training roots at Kaiser Roseville, where she took on the role of co-director for the two-year postdoctoral neuropsychology program for many years.

Dr. Kim is primarily a generalist neuropsychologist and sees a wide spectrum of clinical cases. As a part of surgical teams, she completes the assessment of surgical patients with neurologic disorders, such as epilepsy and Parkinson's disease. Her past professional history also involved the assessment and management of youth sports concussion. However, her primary passion is in the training of future neuropsychologists. Supportive and developmental in her practice as a clinical supervisor, knowledge-based, skills acquisition, and compassionate care are her guiding principles for training.

Joel Solomon, Psy.D. Supervisor

Joel Solomon, Psy.D. is a clinical neuropsychologist within the Departments of Mental Health and Wellness in Roseville and Sports Medicine at Kaiser Permanente located in the Golden 1 Sports Center.

He earned a bachelor's degree in Psychology and doctoral degree in Clinical Psychology at Xavier University in Cincinnati, OH. He completed an APA-accredited internship in Clinical Psychology with an emphasis in Neuropsychology at the Carl T. Hayden VA Medical Center in Phoenix, AZ.

He subsequently completed a two-year post-doctoral fellowship in Clinical Neuropsychology at the Kaiser Permanente Center for Neuropsychological Services in North Valley. After licensure, he worked at an outpatient clinic at Mercy General Hospital for over 13 years. In that role, he conducted neuropsychological evaluations

with a variety of clinical populations; however, the majority of his work was the traumatic brain injury (TBI) population.

He was the primary clinician for post-TBI neuropsychological evaluations, and he also evaluated youth sports athletes, working in conjunction with their physicians to inform return-to-play decisions. In addition, he served as the clinical neuropsychologist for Mercy's grant funded TBI Program, in which capacity he completed neuropsychological evaluations, provided neuropsychological education and counseling for patients and families, facilitated TBI support groups, taught the monthly Concussion Recovery Class, and provided public and professional education regarding TBI. He returned to Kaiser Permanente in 2023.
